
Over the past three years, we have witnessed the transformative power of these initiatives, as we have witnessed children blossom and thrive in our care.

# About us

Sanrakshan, an NGO established in 2020 in Bengaluru, Karnataka, runs a residential home for 50 girls on the premises of the Government Higher Primary and High School, Juganahalli, Rajajinagar, Bangalore. It is currently benefiting 50 girls between ages 6-18 from economically and socially marginalized backgrounds. It has the approval of the state Directorate of Child Protection, the Department of Public Instruction (Education), and the Child Welfare Committee II, Bengaluru.

Started in August 2020 during the challenging Covid-19 crisis, Sanrakshan has its office in Mathikere in north-west Bengaluru. It has 18 full-time paid staff and 8 volunteers, while the Society office bearers render voluntary service with no remuneration.

The Secretary and CEO, Mr. Rajashekhar M. has over 22 years of experience in the development sector. He has worked with children in difficult circumstances, children in contact with the railways, with government Child Care Institutions, and with policy formulation regarding the care of children when he oversaw the programmes of SATHI, a national-level NGO working on child protection. Sanrakshan meets all statutory requirements such as registration under the Societies Act and FCRA (including bank account with SBI), registration under the Income Tax Act (including for 80G, 12A), in the Darpan2 portal of NITI Aayog and in CSR under the Companies Act 2013.

Sanrakshan's work is aligned with the national efforts to protect children (the girl child in particular) and ensure their development and well-being through collaborative efforts of NGO-government-private sector partnerships.

Sanrakshan is currently present in Bengaluru (Karnataka), Kanpur and Lucknow (Uttar Pradesh) and Patna (Bihar).

## Vision

To create a world where every child enjoys the right to live with dignity and complete childhood without discrimination of any kind and free from abuse, violence, exploitation, and neglect.

## Mission

To work as a catalyst to bring sustainable change in the lives of children and youth from underprivileged and marginalized communities

## Values

For SANRAKSHAN, every child matters and every child counts; and without their restoration, reintegration, and mainstreaming, the society and country cannot progress.

## What is unique about this project?

The cost factor, safety factor and promoting girls' education. Most children's homes are run in premises that are rented or owned by an NGO. Government Child Care Institutions (CCI) incur heavy costs in terms of infrastructure, staffing and operational costs. Sanrakshan, on the contrary, aims to keep costs low while educating children. The home at Rajajinagar runs in the premises of a 30-year-old government school. Three to five decades ago, state-run Government schools in Karnataka catered to large numbers of children as private schools were far and few. However, in recent times, with an increase in access to private schools and quality education, the number of student footfalls in Government schools has drastically reduced. But the fact is that the need for Government schools remains vital as it caters to children coming from marginalized and poor backgrounds who are just about able to afford a basic education.

In poor families, even today, girls are stopped from school after puberty while boys are supported for schooling and beyond. Through a sustained campaign, Sanrakshan has encouraged families to continue to send their daughters to school, while it supports the costs of food and shelter for them. This strategy has not only utilized vacant space in the school but also increased enrolment and retention of girls in school, besides increasing teacher motivation through its support for their efforts.

Sanrakshan has made modifications in the school premises to accommodate board and lodging for the children. It has also installed a water filter, built washrooms and renovated existing ones, and arranged for medical check-ups and for a counsellor who comes in weekly. Children enjoy outings, indoor and outdoor games, sports, and cultural entertainment. There are quarterly parent meetings to encourage them to value their daughters and prioritize their education.

Over 48% of the girls currently in the Sanrakshan home are orphans, from broken families, woman-headed households, or families with alcohol-based domestic violence situations. They benefit enormously from having a stable environment in which to learn, be with other children, and grow up in the care of supportive adults, while also being in touch with their families. They are being prepared for national merit scholarships and overall, for a promising future.

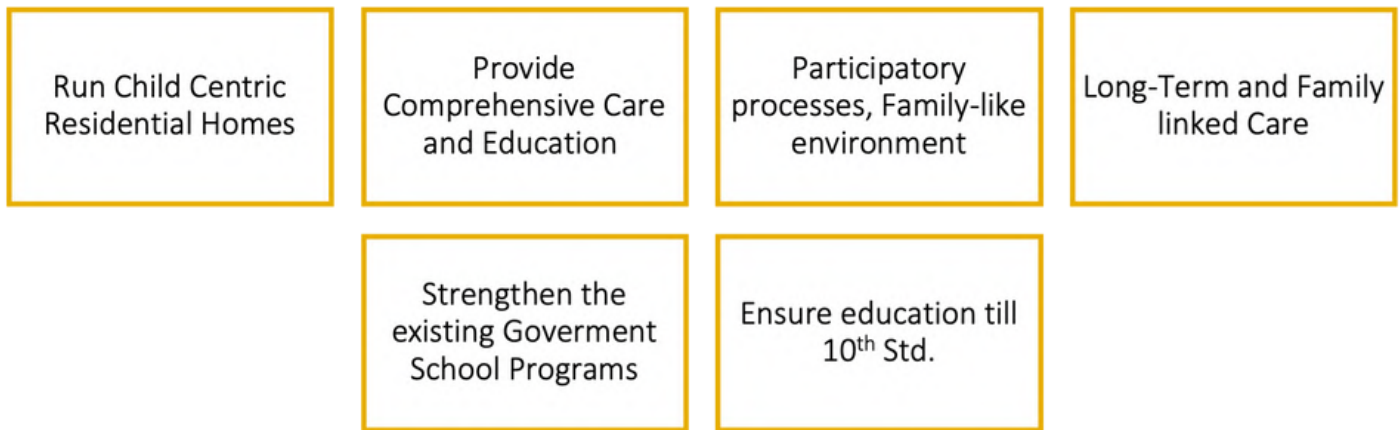
We have plans for providing digital literacy skills for girls, skill training for school leavers, and linking them to livelihoods and emerging job opportunities.

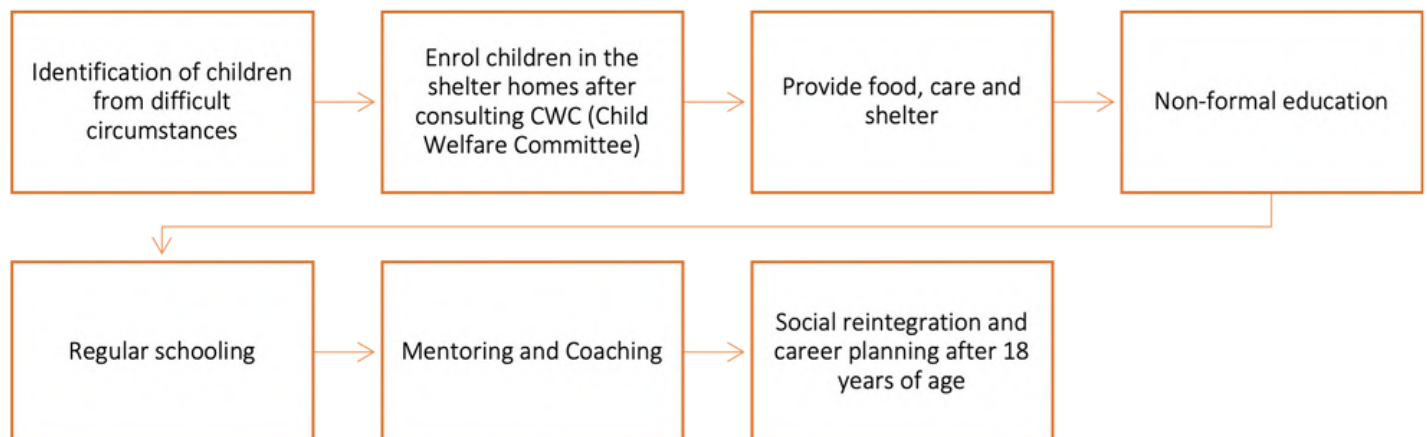

## Approach and Methodology

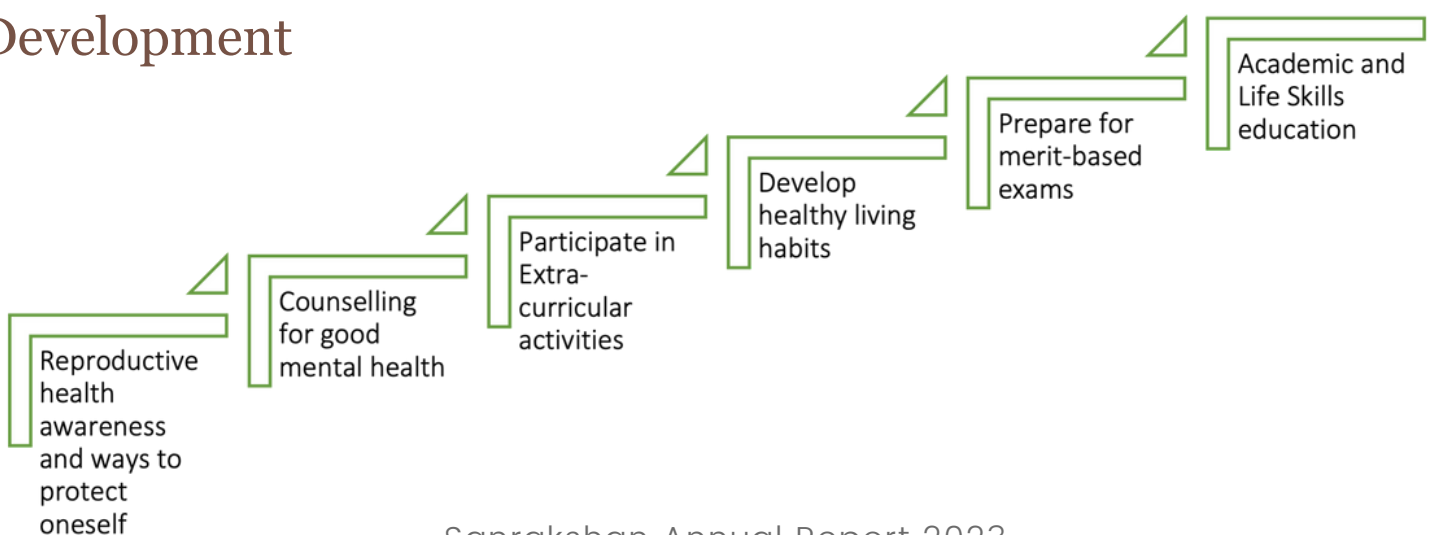

# Our programmes

## Sanrakshan Rainbow Home

Empowering Street and Vulnerable Children through Child Care Institutions  
**(Focus on residential care, protection, and comprehensive education)**

In response to concerns regarding the safety of girls during the pandemic, Sanrakshan in collaboration with Rainbow Foundation India established safe residential facilities at Rajajinagar Government School, Bengaluru, Karnataka with the aim to 'Empower Street and Vulnerable Children of Migrant Families'. The Rainbow Community Child Care Centre focuses on the holistic development of girls who are either homeless or come from a hostile home environment of violence and abuse.

The programme has been successfully running for the past two years, with 48 girls aged between 7 – 17 years currently residing at the centre. Besides receiving formal education along with board and lodging, girls at the shelter also get an opportunity to grow as individuals through talent identification and skill-based interest in sports, music, art and more. It offers girls the guidance and support required to become financially independent, resilient, and an inspiration to others in their community.

## Community – Based Care

The Community - Based Care programme provides comprehensive care in areas related to Food security, Education, Life skills, Health, and Emotional care through a Learning Centre. Such a centre has been established at Rayasandra, a small village on the outskirts of south Bengaluru for children of a nomadic tribe who are school dropouts.

### Community Learning Centre

At the Community Learning Centre, the children receive value education, socio-cultural formation, and counselling.

The centre also works with the families to strengthen their awareness of various social issues, especially related to children and their safety, access to their entitlements, joint childcare plans, and more such issues.

Through this programme, the organization has reached 82 children and their families.

## 'Future' Programme

Future Programme was recently introduced by Sanrakshan to address the needs of young adults who leave childcare institutions at the age of 18. As these young adults lack social, emotional, and financial support, the programme aims to offer support, guidance and life skills for their integration into the world outside and for career development. It enhances not only academic achievements but also facilitates vocational training. It assists them to pursue higher education and job opportunities. The programme also involves raising awareness regarding the opportunities available for skilled employment and self-employment. This is to ensure that these young adults make a smooth transition towards becoming stable, independent, and responsible adults. This programme is for girls who are above the age of 18 and attend university or are looking for work after schooling.

Currently, four girls are associated with this programme and 2 are studying in class 12th at Panchajanya Vidyapeeth, Rajajinagar, Bengaluru, the other 2 girls are studying in a Nuring college.

# Highlights of the year

- Mr. Suresh Kumar, MLA, Rajajinagar, and former Education Minister, Karnataka inaugurated a room for our junior children on 28th June 2022 in the Rajajinagar Rainbow Home. Mr Vasudeva Sharma, founder of Child Rights Trust was the special guest. It was an honor that the minister himself visited and underscored the importance of education for girls.
- With the assistance of Rtn Naagheash, President of Rotary Club, Malleshwaram, Bengaluru, our organization helped our children to apply for scholarships in the month of August 2022. Two of our children visited Rotary House in preparation for the scholarship exam. One of them received a scholarship of INR 3000.
- Our girls in the Home participated in the Rise Against Hunger India programme at Ramamurthy Nagar on International World Food Day, October 16, 2022. They learned about hygienic food packaging and nutrition. They got an opportunity to entertain themselves through dancing and singing.
- 31 girls (Nazmin, Ganagamma, Lakshmi. R, Sowmya, Swapna. N Eshwari, Sujatha, Suvarna. K, Kavya, Savita, Monika, Susmitha, Doulabi, Komalakshi, Bagyalakshmi, Rakha, Netra, Raskshitha, Shwetha, Aishwarya, Girija, Kaveri, Chaitra.M, Nandini, Chinnu, Chaitra. N, Renuka, Sandhya, Maheshwari, Nasrin, and Rajeshwari) participated in Nakshatra 2022, an event organized by NGO Bhumi. They had an exciting time taking part in dancing, painting, singing, rangoli, and other competitions. We are glad that our children gain exposure to cultural activities.
- We launched our English-speaking programme called Aarunya (meaning 'compassionate') in November 2022, sponsored by SATHI, a well-wisher NGO. The aim of the programme is to enhance the children's spoken English abilities.
- Nalaboyal Swapna and Rakshitha participated in the District Level Cluster Games organized by the school they live and study in, the Government Higher Primary School, Juganahalli. They won 1st and 2nd place in the Discus Throw competition.
- A dining hall-cum-programme hall for children 10 -14 years was constructed in the Rajajinagar school in December 2022 at a cost of Rs. 4 lacs with funding from Mr. Naagheash, President, Rotary Club, Malleshwaram, Bengaluru, and Mr.Venkatesh,Accel.

# Case studies of Hope and Achievement

## Abandoned on the streets by her parents



A girl full of dreams, Radhika was 13 years old when she stepped into Sanrakshan Rainbow Home in 2019. Her parents were daily wage workers and lived in a temporary shed. They abandoned all their children and went away. The children have no relatives. Radhika has three siblings, the oldest among them is Renuka who is married and takes care of her other siblings. Radhika's 2 siblings stay with the sister's family and are pursuing their education in classes 10th and PUC respectively. Renuka worked to take care of her siblings, but later put them into our Child Care Institution (CCI) for better care. Radhika's other sister, Rajeshwari studied till the 7th class in Kodihalli Namma Mane before she came to the CCI.

Radhika was an infant when her parents left her near a garbage dump. What Radhika went through at such an age is unimaginable. She has a hearing problem stemming from insect bites at that time. At Sanrakshan she experienced a loving and accepting environment in which to grow, study and blossom. Radhika is now in the 9th grade. She is hardworking, brilliant in her studies, sensitive, empathetic, courteous, and balanced. She loves singing. She has good communication skills and is responsible, honest, determined, and a leader for her friends and classmates. She does not share much about her feelings with others and is reserved and quiet. From an abandoned child to a lovable teenager, Radhika stands out as a role model for her peers. It is remarkable how a family or family-like environment can help a child grow up feeling safe, secure, and able to think of a bright future.

## Orphan and struggling for survival by begging

Vinitha, 8 years was rescued by one of the staff in 2018. Her father was unemployed and an alcoholic who physically abused his wife and children. The mother left the home along with her children and moved to another area. Unfortunately, she too was an alcoholic and often unwell. Vinitha lost her father to alcoholism and TB. Her mother although ill, took care of the children until she too passed away.

When Vinitha was first identified, her mother was still alive and desperately wanted her children to live in a safe place after her. By the time the girl was rescued and brought to the CCI the following week, the mother had passed away. At the time, Vinitha and her sister were living in a makeshift settlement and had resorted to begging for survival.



# Case studies of Hope and Achievement

Vinitha does not clearly remember her past, and most information during the intake process was given by her sister. It was learnt that they were 8 siblings - 6 shared the same biological father and 2 were stepsister and stepbrother. One of her siblings had died young in an accident and another had passed away from a heart attack at 16. Medical check-ups revealed that all siblings, except Vinitha, were HIV positive. They are all now sheltered in Cavalry Chapel Home of Hope for Special Children, Bangalore. After undergoing so much hardship at such a tender age, Vinitha finally found her home in Sanrakshan.

A school dropout from the primary level itself, Vinitha could not read and write when she came to Sanrakshan. She studied hard in our bridge course program here and was mainstreamed to 2nd Std. in the Rajajinagar school. She is a good student and now does her homework and other tasks independently. She is responsible and well-behaved. She is sensitive to herself and others. Vinitha's unstoppable courage and willpower have made her succeed where others might have given up. Sanrakshan takes the utmost care to help children in difficult circumstances rescued by them get over their childhood traumas and have a safe and caring environment to grow up in.

## Witness to abuse and murder of mother



Sharanya has had an extremely traumatic childhood. She is an orphan and was found at age 9 on the streets of Bilekahalli in south Bangalore. The family was involved in rag picking. Her father died from an illness while her mother was sexually abused, beaten up and murdered by a scrap dealer and his brother in front of the children. After her mother's death, the sister of the scrap dealer took Sharanya and her three siblings under her wing. However, she made them work as rag pickers and used to beat them every day. Sharanya's older sister had an abusive child marriage, was rescued, and now stays in a shelter home with her child while the case is still in the Family Courts.

The second sister, now studying in the 10th Std. is sheltered at another CCI, while Sharanya's younger brother is not traceable. When Sharanya first came to the Sanrakshan Home, she was afraid of others. With reassurance and care from our caregivers and the friendly attitude of other children, she slowly started mingling with them. Sharanya can read and write as she attended primary school earlier. She is not yet mainstreamed in school and is undergoing the bridge course. Sharanya, now aged 14, is very happy in our Home and has grown to be a very empathetic and responsible girl. She is extremely creative and talented and loves to help other children. Sanrakshan may be based in north Bangalore, but our reputation based on the quality of care and protection of children entrusted to us has got the Social Welfare Board and its agencies, the police, and the public to refer children in distress to us.

# Events and Activities

At Sanrakshan, we believe that along with quality education, there are other aspects like development of the mind, body and life skills that play an equally important role in a child's holistic development. At the centre we ensure that every developmental stage of a child is given utmost priority that enables them to grow up safe and secure into adulthood.

## Physical activities



Physical activity is one of the foundations for an active and healthy life. Therefore, every day except Sundays, the Sanrakshan Home organizes yoga sessions for the girls under the guidance of Mr. Govindh, an experienced yoga teacher. They also practice meditation and exercises which help them perform better at school. The importance of providing a routine for growing children cannot be overestimated, as it provides them with boundaries while also making them feel secure in a dependable environment.

## Education

To bridge the gap in children's learning levels, the Sanrakshan Home offers a bridge course for children. The bridge course teaches reading and writing in Kannada, Hindi, English – whichever is familiar to the child. Remedial classes are held for children who have challenges coping with school lessons and homework in subjects difficult for them.



The Sanrakshan Home also set up a library with storybooks in Kannada and English to stimulate the reading habit among the children. There are two library sessions every month where the students get an opportunity to read a favourite book and improve their reading skills and vocabulary.

# Events and Activities

## Nutrition

The Food Committee at Sanrakshan with 9 girls, ensures that healthy and high-quality nutritious meals are provided to the children regularly. Their heights and weights are measured monthly to check for malnutrition. A doctor's periodic visits to the Home for check-ups also ensure the children stay healthy



## Life skill training and activities

Life skill training programmes are conducted to empower children with knowledge on life matters. Some of the sessions were conducted by Enfold India on reproductive and sexual health. Here, the children have learned about safe and unsafe touch, sexual abuse, attraction to the opposite sex, and other topics that help these girls get a better understanding of their childhood and prepare them for responsible adolescence. Life skills activities also include practical skills like time management, cleanliness, respect for the ecology, and social awareness.

## Extra-curricular activities



Several extra-curricular activities like dancing, singing, drawing, painting, creative art, drama, sports, and storytelling are organized every month at the Sanrakshan Home to help children recognise and develop their talent, interest, and passion. The children wait for these occasions as they provide an outlet for their creative spirit, imagination, and talents.



## Counselling

**Individual Counselling for Home Children:** We conducted regular in-depth counselling sessions for children during the months of April to September 2022. These sessions included Behaviour Modification Techniques along with empathetic listening and space for children to voice their thoughts and feelings. Specific interventions and mentoring sessions are also conducted if the need arises.

**Intervention session for children in the 'Future' Programme:** The centre also organises counselling sessions for children enrolled in the Future Programme (which prepares adolescents for adult life). The intervention and guidance are meant for dealing with issues related to motivation, adjusting to a new environment and dealing with other internal and external factors in the process of adulting.

**Age-appropriate group sessions and psychoeducation:** Every month we organize group sessions and psycho-education. This is conducted to help children build their support systems and learn to deal with problems collectively. It also helps in strengthening interpersonal relationships and effective coping strategies in teamwork and crises.

**Solution-Focused Interventions during Bal Sabha (Children's Committee Meetings)** This is organized by the children at the Home where they, along with the staff discuss day-to-day problems which need immediate attention. The solutions are proposed and adopted through arriving a consensus.

**Counselling to deal with Transition:** We organize counselling sessions for children who are going through a difficult transition in their lives (reaching age 18, moving to another Home, going back to family, etc.). These sessions help them to think rationally and realistically about how to deal with a transition in a functional manner.

**TED Talks and psycho-educational group sessions:** These sessions are usually held in June and July, where children attend online TED Talks organised by the counsellor. Some of the topics that were discussed in the past years have included Healthy Habits, Hygiene Practices, and Self-Awareness. Psycho-educational group sessions covered topics about Mindfulness, Learning styles and Emotional Regulation. These classes are conducted by a volunteer under the supervision of the home's counsellor.

**Specific Family Counselling Interventions on CWC order:** We conduct specific family counselling sessions as directed by the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) of Bengaluru Urban District. This includes mentoring and guidance of children and their parents and siblings, understanding their family dynamics, parental situation, and wellbeing, safety, and protection, and present financial status. Such sessions help our team and the CWC make informed decisions about the future of a child in our care.

**Counselling pre-SSLC- results and remedial sessions:** The students who were to appear for the SSLC board exams this year received special remedial study sessions. One of the children, a slow learner, passed the SSLC exam after a remedial session in which her learning style was identified, and she was guided to leverage it to study better and do better academically.

**Vocational Guidance and Career Counselling:** We conducted special counselling sessions for the girls who were to sit for the SSLC exams. These sessions include career guidance, issues in adolescence and tips and tricks to overcome exam fears and perform better. The children also got an opportunity for one-on-one sessions with the counsellor to figure out career and life plans after their SSLC results.

## Children's Committees

Sanrakshan believes that having a routine for children in their early years has a tremendous positive effect on their mental and emotional health, leading to sharper mental awareness better emotional well-being, and being more energetic and productive throughout the day. These Children's Committees, formed under the supervision of our staff team, help children to develop positive habits early on in life. It also helps them to develop planning, teamwork, and leadership skills.

Cleaning(08)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>•Maintaining cleanliness of the Home and making sure that the cleaning is done regularly.</li></ul>
Sports and Welcome(09)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>•Welcoming visitors and attendees at functions, meetings, and events, as well as ensuring that all children participate in sports and cultural activities.</li></ul>
Purchase(08)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Purchasing of material required in the Home under the supervision of the staff</li></ul>

## Events

Goonj organized a menstrual hygiene awareness programme in the Rajajinagar school in July 2022



A quarterly health camp was organized by Bhoomi at the centre for children and their parents on 30th July 2022

A Community - Based family meeting was organized on July 31, 2022, to communicate and discuss the plans for the CBC (community-based care) and Future programmes. Mr. Jaikar, State Coordinator, CBC and Mr. Rajashekhar, Founder of Sanrakshan, gave each child an educational and grocery kit at the end of the meeting.

The Patna Riders Kabaddi team visited our organization on 3rd October 2022 and taught the game to the children. Mr. Suresh Kumar, MLA, Rajajinagar Constituency Bengaluru, and Ex-Minister Higher Primary & Secondary Education and Govt. of Karnataka were also present at the event.



Sub-Inspector Geeta and Mr. Shreedhar, constable, from the Yeshwantpur Police Station Cybercrime team, visited the Home on October 19, 2022. They spoke to the children about possible career opportunities in the Police force and provided information about competitive examinations.

## Events

A career development session with Ms. Manjula Telegada, State Future Coordinator, Rainbow Foundation India was organised on October 13, 2022, for the children who are enrolled in the Future Programme.

Mr. Narayana, Gym trainer, at GET FIT gym, was invited to come and talk to the children on October 21, 2022, about the importance of physical fitness and meditation.



A session on National Means-cum-Merit Scholarship (NMMS) was organized for students of classes 8th – 10th standard in November 2022. This session was conducted by Ms. Muskan Agarwal, a volunteer, at NGO Bhumi, who spoke to them on ways in which they can prepare for competitive examinations



Our children attended a workshop organized on 5th February 2023 on the ways to overcome their fear of examinations. The workshop was facilitated by Ms. Princy, Research Assistant, National Institute of Mental Health, and Neurosciences (NIMHANS), Bengaluru, and Mr. Samson, Assistant Professor, Montfort College (a counselling training institute), Bengaluru.

- An awareness program on “National Deworming Day” was organized on 10th February 2023 by Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) doctors from Rajajinagar.
- Ms. Ravikumari, our Community-Based Care coordinator on 22nd November 2022 spoke to the children on sensitive issues related to abuse and mental wellbeing.
- The Amazon team from Bengaluru visited the Home and spoke to the children about future career opportunities in Amazon India.
- 15 girls from the Home participated in the Global Handwashing Day activities on October 15, 2022. As a part of the Government school's handwashing awareness, the children were taught different hand-washing techniques for better hygiene.
- Our girls in the Home participated in the Rise Against Hunger India programme at Ramamurthy Nagar on International World Food Day, October 16, 2022. They learned about hygienic food packaging and nutrition. They got an opportunity to entertain themselves through dancing and singing.
- A get-together was organized for parents and children on January 8th, 2023, with the help of United Way, Bengaluru followed by fun games and activities conducted by NGO Magic Bus.

## Educational Trips

- We organized a visit to the Indian Music Experience Museum in JP Nagar, Bengaluru. This outing and experience of seeing, touching, and playing musical instruments there helped children enhance their musical sensibilities and gain knowledge about various musical instruments.
- Sanrakshan organised a picnic-cum-educational trip on 13th November 2022, with the help of Reshma Reddy, Relationship Manager, and social activist of NGO iVolunteer. As part of this treat, the children got an opportunity to watch the movie "Gandhadhagudi" (Sandalwood Hill) by the famous late actor Puneet Rajkumar. Along with being entertained, they learned the importance of conserving forests and wildlife and restoring and valuing the natural beauty of Karnataka.
- The children were taken to Jawaharlal Nehru Planetarium and the Sir. M. Visweswaraiiah Museum, Bengaluru on the 10th of December 2022 as part of an educational trip.

# Capacity Building and Training Sessions

- Sanrakshan organized a staff training program on 21st December 2022 on Child Rights and the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child at the Child Rights Trust (CRT) office in Bengaluru. Mr. Nagasimha G. Rao, Director of CRT spoke to our staff on child-related issues and legal pathways to uphold child rights and report child abuse.
- A capacity-building workshop was organised by Rainbow Foundation (Sanrakshan's donor and partner) at the Home on 26th November 2022. The staff team was given an induction to understand Rainbow Foundation's history, its operations; and the use of certain software such as 'Ruby on Rails' and a few more. They attended Child Protection Policy Training, an NGO at City Desk, organised by Rainbow Home National Program Team Ms. Shubhada and Ms. Sathya.
- A Legal Literacy session was conducted on January 25th, 2023 for the Sanrakshan staff team on Child Rights, The Juvenile Justice Act, and The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012 at Bengaluru. The workshop was facilitated by lawyers Ms Saba and Ms Purna who explained practical issues related to the rescue of abused children and how to handle these.
- A capacity-building session for staff using the 'River of Life' exercise was facilitated by Dr. Lalitha Iyer, Managing Trustee, Plustrust, Bengaluru, on January 2nd, 2023. The session helped them examine their own life journeys and how various life events have shaped them, thus enhancing their awareness about their self and behaviour.
- Workshops were organized every 2 months to teach Sanrakshan staff Email communication, the use of Microsoft Office application tools, basic life skills, and more. The sessions were facilitated by Ms. Pavithra, Project-in-charge, Sanrakshan. Staff capacity building is an important part of Sanrakshan's work.
- Members of our team participated in a District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) training session we organised at Shishu Mandir, K R Puram, under the guidance of Ms. Bharathi and Ms. Lakshmi from the DCPU on 26th August 2022. The session reinforced the knowledge of our team on rules and regulations of The Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015, adoption procedures, the laws that govern adoption policies, and how to interpret the Competition Act, 2002 for the administration, implementation, and enforcement of the Act (Competition Commission of India).
- Sanrakshan staff participated in a workshop on the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act. This event was organized by the National Management Information System along with Ms. Kushi Kushalappa, Director, Support & Rehabilitation, Enfold India, another child protection NGO. Issues on sexual abuse, the Juvenile Justice Act 2015, the POCSO Act, and its main provisions were covered.
